Antony Molho
(brief curriculum vitae)

Antony Molho received his education in his native Greece, the United States, and Italy. From 1966 to 2000, he taught at Brown University, from which he retired as The David Herlihy University Professor Emeritus. From 2001 through 2010 he taught at the European University Institute, with which he continues to be affiliated in his capacity as Professor Emeritus. In 2010, he was awarded the Galileo Galilei International Prize for his contributions to the study of Italian history. He has been visiting professor at the University of Florence (1983-1985), University of Athens (1999), the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Sciences Sociales (1994), the Maison des Sciences de l'homme (1996) in Paris, New York University (2011-2012), and at the Florence branch of Stanford University (2012). He has held numerous fellowships, among which from the Guggenheim Foundation, the Harvard University Center for Italian Renaissance Studies, the Ghetty Foundation, the Social Science Research Foundation, and others. For the past five years, he has been a member of the European Research Council's History and Archaeology Selection Panel for young scholars, which he chaired in 2012. He has written on the history of public finance, of the state and of the family from the 13th to the 17th centuries; he has also been interested in the history of the early modern Mediterranean, in the concept of Europe, and in the history of historiography. Currently, he is co-editing a special issue of *Jewish History* on the history of the Jews in Thessaloniki, and writing a book devoted to a group of historians of medieval and early modern Europe, who, following their exile to the United States in the 1920s and 1930s, transformed the study of the Renaissance and of early modern Europe.
